




# Quran on Hajj






### More about Hajj

For many Muslims, the Haj is an experience that rejuvenates and strengthens their faith and transforms them. It sparks a newfound sense of purpose and stronger faith.




#### The Kabah




# What is Hajj?

Hajj traces back to the days of Prophet Abraham. Muslims honor his journey and retrace his steps during Hajj, cementing it as a crucial pillar of their faith.




# Hajj and Eid al-Adha


# Backbone
